Three Faces

I've heard it said that within a lifetime we have three faces. When we are born and as we mature we have the face our parents gave us. In our middle years and through our prime we have the face that we ourselves gave us. And finally, in the last third of our lives, we have the face that life gives us. Today, when I look in the mirror, I see my whole life reflected there.

When Peter died in 1993, he still wore the face that we had given him. It was a lovely face with so much promise, so many unrealized hopes and dreams. It is a face that continues to stare out at me from every picture frame. It is an indelible, worry-free face and now, years later, I agonize that I cannot know what face he would have created for himself.

I have tried unsuccessfully to rationalize his abruptly cancelled life. Though he will know no successes, he will also never know failure. He will never know triumph, nor will he know tragedy. He will never know pleasure, nor will he know pain. Can I take comfort in that?

I think of what I expected life to be like for me by now. As we travel through the continuum of life, those who accompany us as peers go through life's passages in similar time. The kids we are kids with grow as we grow into adults. Within a cluster of years we all marry, then we have our own kids and share the experiences as our kids grow up and we grow old. Our kids all go through their life's passages as we all look on, comparing notes and experiences. They go through college together, they begin their careers together, they marry and they have children – our grandchildren – all within the same cluster of years.

Thoughts on Mary Todd Lincoln by Mary LaTour

Abraham Lincoln has always been my most admired and respected figure in the history of our country. After standing in front of his statue at the Lincoln Memorial, no one could ever forget the terrible, marked sadness in his face, his forlorn and melancholy attitude.

I have been picking up, from other chapter newsletters, the many pieces of prose and poetry attributed to Lincoln which speak so poignantly of grief, and I have researched the Lincoln life. It is for his wife, Mary, for whom I cringe now when I read how life dealt with her. Washington gossip circles referred to her "mental state," and that she was "deranged" and "eccentric."

The Lincolns had four sons. Edward, their second son, died in February 1850 when nearly four. Their third son, Willie, was born in December of that year and died in February 1862 at the age of 11. Then, the tragedy of tragedies...In April 1865, President Lincoln was assassinated in front of his wife's eyes. Her grief must have been worse than inconsolable.

How could life deal such a terrible fate to one woman? How could any one of us deal with such multiple tragedies? We know how easy it is to feel as if we are "going crazy," and how common that feeling is. To share that feeling in Compassionate Friends is more than wonderful... to be assured that it is common, to learn and understand from other bereaved parents why we feel that way, and that it will pass, helps immeasurably.

But tragedy stalked Mary Lincoln's footsteps, for not quite six years later Tad was killed at age 18 in January 1871. History books do not say, but I pray that Mrs. Lincoln had one compassionate friend who understood her grief over the death of her three sons and her husband. One friend wrote of her: "Poor Mrs. Lincoln. She's been a deranged person".

Yes, of that I am sure. And I am thankful for The Compassionate Friends.

With similar expectations, we all continue on life's path as our parents did. By now though, life may be complicated by the trials of caring for aging parents, or our own personal struggles. But in our children we can be assured that whatever our disappointments or difficulties, the continuum of life and of hope goes on. Through our children we watch our own lives renewed in their daily discovery of what we all experienced so many years ago – as our parents watched us and celebrated our own little victories. Like Bolero, the same musical phrase, repeated and repeated with an ongoing steadily increasing rhythm – so our lives continue on in the steady predictable pace history has proscribed.

Unless, of course, some cosmic calamity causes a monumental shift in the natural order of things and some of us are left late in life to figure out how to navigate unprepared through a totally unexpected life. I say this now, writing from the perspective of the 21st century, a most complicated time. I remember my own parents ruminating on a "simpler" time when they spoke of their own youth. Though theirs was a youth impacted by depression and war, it seemed to them a less complicated time looking back with their families intact. I think too, that our earlier life was a simpler time and probably those who come after us will think the same thing about their early years. Life, to the young, is quite simply, less complicated.

So what is it that makes this a more complicated or difficult time? Could it be that enormous, incalculable, unrelenting loss – the kind of loss that leaves its indelible mark on your soul – the loss of a child – is what defines the time? For me, I suspect that may be the case. As world events define a decade, so do life events define a life. Despite my attempts to reinvent myself, to fill my life with as much love as I can collect among the caring friends, both old and new, who enrich my life, I am still defined by the one, life altering experience that has no equal. I am a bereaved parent. And even more, I am bereft of my only child. It is a void nothing – no one – can fill. It is a loss that is written all over my face.

But enough. It is Spring. I can see. I can feel. I can dance. I can hope. The trees are sprouting, the garden is returning. The babies are growing. The music is playing and the sun is shining.

Life continues. And so do I .

Surviving the Guilt

When you go to bed at night, you are (hopefully) easing into being content that the day is over. Everyone is home, tucked in their beds, you've accomplished what needed to be done and drifting off to sleep, satisfied. All is quiet and your family is safe.

That was how I felt when I went to bed the night Andrew died. My daughter was out with friends but my two sweet boys were safe and secure enclosed in the warm walls of our home. I went to sleep knowing that I had had a successful day of organizing a closet and taking down holiday decorations. All was right in the world.

An hour later, nothing was right. My world was turned upside down. My life, as I knew it, forever changed. I was inspired to write this after reading an article posted on Facebook, by Angela Miller, author and creator of A Bed For My Heart, an online community for child loss.

'I Wasn't Sure If I Could Survive': What It's Like to Lose a Child struck a cord with me. Particularly, this quote:

"One of the unique features about losing a child is that there is always a sense of guilt there," she explains. "The role of being a parent is to keep your child present and on this earth and healthy and well, so regardless of the circumstances, mothers often feel like they failed. It's such a huge burden to carry."

I have had extreme guilt since losing Andrew. I couldn't understand it...he was home. He was safe at home, in his room. I was 20 ft down the hall from him. I was right there. I had checked on him before retiring to my room. By all accounts, in my mind, I failed him. Failed to do the most basic part of being a mother...keeping him alive.

I've carried this immense guilt inside of me. Guilt that I could not keep my child alive. Guilt knowing that while I was asleep, he was literally dying 20 feet from me and I didn't know. How could I not have woken up? Why didn't my motherly instinct naturally kick in and stir me to get up. Why didn't I know something was not right. Something was wrong. Why couldn't I save my child's life. Why didn't I run into his room and revive him. Why was I content and at peace in my bed because I organized a fucking closet!

Why. Why. Why.

It has taken me a very long time to understand that I will never be able to understand that night. I know I did not do anything wrong. Andrew's death was the most freak accident. It was not my fault. However, carrying the guilt and surviving the guilt is something I face every day. It is etched into my soul. The basic instinct of protecting my child was robbed from me.

"I began to see my writing journey as another way to honor Hudson's memory; I also say often that the only thing that brings me any consolation after her death is knowing that her life can still have meaning, that she can still have an impact on others and the world even though she is no longer physically here. So if sharing my story helps someone else, I feel like that is the greatest way to honor her and to comfort myself."

While I fight these demons inside, I push through, for Andrew. For his life. For his memory. Speaking his name. Sharing his story. Being there for others who have children with ADHD. Supporting them. Advocating. Anything I can do to honor Andrew.

Everything I do is honoring Andrew's memory. Making sure to live a life that he is proud of. And that includes, surviving the guilt.

Siblings...

If you told me I'd be in group therapy someday, I would have laughed at you. Before Russell died, it wasn't even a possibility. Me? Talking about my feelings in a group setting like that? Never. Well, life has a way of presenting cruel ironies sometimes, because I honestly don't know how I'd be doing if it weren't for the supportive environment TCF provides.

I remember reading early on a list of stupid things people say. It was comforting to know that it wasn't just the people in my life who didn't now what to say. It's kind of funny even to think that some people are so confounded and uncomfortable with what to say that they end up saying something stupid and uninformed just to say ANYthing. I can't remember the entire list that I came across, but I have come up with my own top three most insensitive and/or ignorant statements that I've been confronted with:

- 1. I know EXACTLY how you feel. My grandmother/goldfish/friend of a friend just died."
- 2. "That's awful. How's your mother taking it?"
- 3. "Ya know, its probably about time you put that behind you and get on with your life."

While all three of these statements anger me, I know that the people who say these things to me mean well, but just have no idea how they make me feel by imposing these ideas on me. At the very least, I know that they are more uncomfortable than I am in dealing with how I feel.

People who apologize for bringing up the subject of Russell, or just of siblings in general do so because it makes them uncomfortable. Personally, I feel like he's on my mind all the time. I don't really need an excuse to start talking about him. I know some people don't know how to respond when you tell them you lost your brother. They'd rather not have brought it up. They apologize as if it's upsetting for me to talk about it. The thing is, it's upsetting PERIOD. Upsetting to think about, upsetting to talk about, but even more upsetting to be alone in dealing with the feelings.

This is why I'm grateful for the forum that Compassionate Friends provides. There is no explanation needed, and no awkward dancing around the subject. If only the rest of the world understood that I don't need them to analyze it, or figure it out for me. All I really need is someone to listen to what I have to say.
