GOING THE DISTANCE

Written in 2003, as I approached the ten-year mark, my sensibilities have not changed. Spring, with its built in "special" days still brings me pause. What makes the biggest difference thirty years in, is the knowledge that I am that much closer to re-uniting with my guys. All the more reason to enjoy the season with its warmth and promise of renewal.

I think I get it now. I'm not certain, but I think that as I approach the ten-year mark, I have figured out how to navigate the lay-ofthe-land so to speak. What was alien territory and so terrifying almost ten years ago has become familiar and much less frightening.

I remember the early days vividly. It's interesting, that it comforts me to know I can remember the early days. I was afraid back then that I might forget the pain – and even while I begged and prayed for it to subside – I knew I wanted it, in some strange way to continue. The pain, the despair was a palpable "something" I could almost touch. It was an unbelievable reality I could wrap myself around while I tried to come to grips with the fact that I would never have my son to wrap my arms around again. My fear back then of forgetting the reality of him alive has been replaced by my acknowledgement of the reality that he is in another place. Now I am no longer fearful. I know the pain is not only not forgotten, it is never far away.

Another Spring is here. Always a difficult season, I now know what to expect. I know that Mother's Day and Father's Day are embedded (new buzz word) in the season. I don't anticipate the day with great anxiety anymore. I know that no one will celebrate with me. I am no longer "angry" (much) that I am an 'outsider' at that party - no longer entertaining a tiny thought that someone might remember and send me a card. I'm not

disappointed anymore because I've become familiar with that reality too. Though I will always be Peter's Mom, Hallmark hasn't tapped into the telepathic market yet.

I've stopped trying to teach the world what it's like. I thought early on in my journey, that I could somehow show the uninitiated a little glimpse of the territory by writing what I was feeling. But I recognize now that the uninitiated aren't supposed to know. The fates are saving them for themselves. When you arrive in this place you must be a "virgin" griever. No amount of warnings or fears can prepare you for this journey.

It's been almost ten years. Impossible, but still true. When you quantify it, in addition to the more than 3650 days, it includes those heavy-duty survival days - ten birthdays, ten anniversary days, ten Thanksgivings, ten Mother's Days, ten Father's Days, ten Springs, ten Summers, ten Christmases and 560 candles – just for Peter.

In all this time, in my quest for understanding, I've come to know hundreds and hundreds of newly bereaved and not so newly bereaved parents. For me, that's been the most helpful learning experience of all. I've learned that we all start off the same way. We arrive here dazed, confused and disbelieving. We all think we may or even want to die. But we really only want to be with our kids again. Those of us who are fortunate enough to find a support system like TCF, ultimately discover we are in a graduate survival program for the grieving. But it's years and years before we recognize that.

Time and my own desperate struggle to survive has paid off. Peter is more totally a part of me now than he might ever have been without my hard-won understanding of the territory. He is an ever -present fixture in my consciousness, attached to every thought, every perception, every emotion, every feeling, every sensibility. He is my constant companion – motivating me, encouraging me, comforting me – waiting for me.

I'm glad I stayed the course and didn't drop out. I'm ready for my degree. I've learned, from those who were here before me, and especially from those who came after me, what it takes to survive. You've all taught me well and I'm still learning. I'm so grateful to those who share my journey.

Peter's got it all figured out. I'm getting there and now I know someday I'll have it all figured out too.

THE GREATEST GRIEF

A sudden terrible accident killed your child. That terrible phone call changed your life with no warning – you didn't get to say good-bye – this has to be the most terrible loss of all.

Your child died by suicide. You feel you should have been able to prevent it. Your guilt is devastating. How can you live with such incomprehensible tragedy?

You only had one child – now you have none and your focus in life is gone. What's the point of living? What could be more devastating?

You've experienced the death of more than one of your children. Will it happen again? How does one survive this pain?

When your baby died, your dreams died. You have few memories and you're too young to be suffering like this. This loss is the most unfair.

Someone murdered your child - an unbelievable violation -

"Some of my friends are uncomfortable with death. I don't blame them, because we work hard to keep death hidden away. Despite the fact that death is happening all the time, we chose to believe it isn't there.

Yet only with familiarity comes understanding. I have been brought close to dying by someone I love, and we are getting acquainted, death and I. I will never be as afraid as I used to be.

Grief is preoccupying. For a while it seems to take all our attention. We forget what day it is – or don't care. We stop attending to public issues in which we have been involved. We may forget appointments, or whom we have seen and under what circumstances.

At first this is inevitable – and appropriate. We need to immerse ourselves in this shocking new world until we, in some sense, "get used to it" – as swimmers, diving into cold water swim vigorously around until they grow accustomed to the temperature.

But we need to be careful. Because we are missing things too. Perhaps we need to make a conscious effort to begin to pay attention to what is happening beyond the pain of grief.

Because we wouldn't want to miss the grass turning green, or the smell of wisteria, or the sound of children laughing.

you're angry and your frustration with the legal system feeds your anger. This must be the very worst.

You're a single parent. Your child has died, and you have no one to lean on, no one to share your grief. Surely your suffering is the most painful.

The unbelievable has happened. Your adult child died. You had invested so much in that child. Now who is going to care for you in your old age?

The truth is that the death of any you're-too-young-to-be-sufferinglike-this - this loss is the most unfair. The truth is that the death of any child is the greatest loss, regardless of the cause, regardless of the age. Our own experience is far more painful than we had ever previously envisioned, so how could we possibly comprehend what others have undergone?

To make comparisons between our own suffering and the pain of others is an exercise in futility. It accomplishes nothing and sometimes can be hurtful to others.

To say that one type of death produces a greater or deeper grief than another tends to place different values on the children who have died. Each child is worthy of 100% of our grief.

Each person's sorrow is 100%, because we love each child, those still living and those who have died, with 100% of our being. I can't imagine wanting to walk in the shoes of any other bereaved parent. Can you?

Siblings

...This month, more from Alan Wofelt's book, "Healing The Siblings Grieving Heart"....

"To the outside world, we all grow old. But not to brothers and sisters. We know each other as we always were. We know each other's hearts. We share private family jokes. We remember family feuds and secrets, family griefs and joys. We live outside the touch of time."

Your brother or sister has died. I am truly sorry for your loss.

Whether your sibling was younger or older, whether the death was sudden or anticipated, whether you were very close to your sibling throughout your lives or experienced periods of separation, you are now grieving.

To grieve is to experience thoughts and feeling of loss inside of you. If you loved your sibling, you will grieve. Even if you had a difficult or ambivalent relationship with your sibling, you will grieve. Expressing your grief is to mourn. And to mourn is to heal.

Sibling relationships

Brothers and sisters often have strong and ambivalent feelings for one another. Relationships among siblings tend to be very complex, characterized by a mixture of anger, jealousy, and a fierce closeness and love. What was your relationship with your sibling? I'll bet it wasn't entirely simple.

The reason that sibling relationships are so complex is that while we are growing up, siblings are both friends and enemies, teammates, and competitors. We play with our siblings and we fight with our siblings. We share our parents' love. We enjoy being part of a family and we struggle to be seen as individuals. And as teenagers, we are developmentally tasked with separating from our families – casting our sibling relationships in a new light.

Sometimes we carry our childhood rivalries and differences into adulthood, and our ambivalent feelings toward our brothers and sisters remain. Sometimes we separate from our siblings completely as adults. And sometimes we become very close friends with our grownup brothers and sisters.

Yet, no matter what your present-day relationship with your sibling was, his or her death is a blow because part of your story has died. You shared a history with your sibling. Your stories began together and were intimately intertwined for years. Who else knew you so well?

At any given time, an estimated 25% of Americans have experienced the death of a sibling. This means that nearly 100 million people in our country have suffered the death of a brother or sister. Yet why do we hear so little about sibling grief?
