In your own way you have met and survived those special days, holidays, his or her birthday and all the events you had anticipated sharing with your child, at least once. Now what? Where do you go from here? Life is going on around you, yet your own life may seem at a standstill. It has had a drastic and traumatic change.

SURPRISE

Surprise is the opposite of expected. The first thing that pops into mind with the word surprise is "happy". I never liked "surprise" parties, but that's the first thing that comes to mind when I hear the word. But truth is, most of life is a surprise. As I write this on the day before New Year's Eve, I think back on 2016 as an apocalyptic year of surprises – both the winners and the losers were surprised.

So many celebrity losses in 2016. So many surprises. Carrie Fisher dies suddenly. And the next day, her Mom joins her. We all get it. It's what we all wished we could do that terrible next day after our own surprise.

After living a reasonably long lifetime, ruminating on the vicissitudes of my life, I am left wondering once again about possibilities. As it turns out, "surprise" (the unexpected) and predictable (the expected) appear to be two sides of the same coin – a coin called "life". We stumble through life doing our best to avoid surprises (bad) and strive to create predictable outcomes (good). Then life happens.

What is interesting is that we do manage to incorporate everything we experience – the good and the not-so-good – into an acceptable life. We expect certain occurrences and passages. We expect to grow up. We expect to grow old. We expect go to school, to learn, to graduate.

The Compassionate Friends is a mutual assistance self-help organization offering friendship and understanding to bereaved parents, grandparents and siblings. We are a group seeking support in our grief or are able to give it. Among us your religion, your race, your politics, your job or social standing are not important. We care about your grief—the tragedy that each of us have shared—and how we can grow through it, not back to the person we were, but to the person we can become.

After One Year....

A tug-o-war wages within your mind and body. Part of you wants to hang on tight to the life you knew when your family was whole. But after a year of grieving and crying for your child, you realize that life as you knew it is no more. The separation death has brought is daily becoming more real.

If you are at this point in your grief, you know how it is. We are weary and tired from the constant effort and energy it takes to keep moving ahead each day. Possibly we find ourselves putting up a false front and saying "okay," "fine", when people ask how we are doing, because we think they feel that's how we should be by now. We remember a year ago, when we looked ahead to this time thinking we would be back to normal, our grief somehow healed and resolved. Now we often seem to be two different people. A person living with the burden of the loss of our child and the emotions, depth of sorrow and pain which only another bereaved parent can understand; and at the same time a person going through the motions of living in the normal world of everyday work, activities, friends, and problems, which we often are tempted to let go on without us. A feeling of panic isn't uncommon, yet you must have developed some survivor skills if you have come this far.

How do we get out of there and go on without leaving the life of our child behind? Some helpful words might be slowly, carefully, patiently, and prayerfully, accepting ourselves as we are, and truthfully facing our feelings. Our own son was killed 18 months ago by a hit and run driver. If you were to peel back my outer shell right now and expose my thoughts, you would see that loving, exciting seventeen-year-old we shared so many good times with and my wish to have him here on his 19th birthday this month. You would see my desire to know more about heaven and God's plan for eternal life, a deep loneliness, fatigue and many unanswered questions. It's strange. I have apprehension as I move back into life, yet a real fear of staying emotionally where I am.

Yes, it is hard to go on because no one can do it for us. The great effort it takes to get out of bed on time in the morning, to plan ahead for dinner and to make the best of each new day must come from within each of us. Now is a good time to take inventory of our resources. Do you have your health, home, husband, other children, other family members, friends, a job, faith in God? Do you have talents which you have neglected or something you always wanted to do which could be developed?

Making an appointment for health or dental check-up, deciding to lose those pounds you gained through frustrated eating; planning some special times with your family, initiating contact with old friends, and rebuilding relationships, releasing new energy into your job, taking time to seriously study your faith, enrolling in a class to learn something new may be the boost you need. Do you have strengths of understanding love, caring, listening? No doubt you have already reached out to help someone else in their need or grief because you know how that kind

We expect to fall in love and we anticipate a natural progression through life – careers, marriage, children. We even learn to expect and survive loss. We lose a pet, a best friend moves away, a young love fades, a grandparent dies. We suffer these losses, and we learn to survive them. Some stay with us as dusty memories. Some fade away to some far-off place too deep to even recall. But we learn that losing is a constant. There will be loss. It can be expected. No one gets out of here alive.

We know too that even we will join those who left this world before us. But in our children, we find comfort, for they will be our continuum. Through them we will experience the future. They are us. They do not die.

And then they do.

Surprise. Now what? We have done everything a human does to incorporate life's surprises into our somewhat ordered life. We learned that no one knows what life has in store, that control is limited, that loss is predictable. *But nowhere was it ever thought possible that a child could die.* Our child. A living, breathing part of our heart. No one told us this was possible. How do we continue with such a broken heart? How do we re-order our remaining lives?

I think of the millions who came before me and lived this calamitous life experience. I recognize now how every newly grieving parent had to start from scratch – there's no playbook or how-to survive this unbelievable, indescribable hurt. Every new resident of this parallel universe must discover for themselves what it will take to survive to the end. And must decide how they want to.

It's another New Year. Some of us are at the beginning of this sorrowful journey. Some of us are far along, getting closer and closer to re-uniting with our missing children. We can only hope that the future holds only manageable surprises and the coming year surprises us by meeting our expectations.

Last summer, a "Things to do" list evolved out of my own frustration of not being able to budge or take even one step forward. Each day I tried to accomplish at least one small task from this list. As I saw little bits of progress, my attitude and depression began to lift. I kept my list very simple thinking of those things which would encourage me to succeed in areas I was weak, such as house work, planning meals and meeting the needs of my family; yet allowing me time for a quiet half hour by myself, going out to dinner with my husband, taking a walk, a bike ride or playing the piano and being available to care for others in a helpful way, especially other bereaved families. Of course, some days are still hard, but over the months my ability to move ahead has gradually increased. If you are stuck in one spot and the obstacles ahead seem too big, I encourage you to make a list of your own to fit your own lifestyle, talents and strengths. Our life is still worthwhile even as we continue to work through our grief.

On The Death Of A Child

When a child dies, a light goes out in the world, never to be replaced. We are overcome by pain and heartbreak which is beyond measurement, and completely unable to comprehend any meaning beyond such tragedy. The loss of such a young life, the finality of it, can hardly be fathomed. We search in vain for an answer to why a life so full of promise and unfulfilled potential has been torn away so prematurely.

Our grief and anguish is unrelenting and unyielding in its intensity. Although we know that death can come quickly, with no warning to any living creature, never in our wildest dreams did any of us imagine that one of our children should be taken – a reverse of the natural order.

At first it seems as if our lives, our souls, the very inner-most substance of our being have been shattered, never to be resurrected again. Our tears, our anguish, conceal any legacy that remains of the child's existence. It is as if we are enveloped in a cloud of darkness and deep despair. The reality of the death is as unforgiving as the sky, the sea, the earth and all eternity.

The inevitability of birth, life and death blankets us with a feeling of futility about the uselessness of it all. It is hard to remember that during the child's short and transitory time on earth, he or she contributed a unique essence of life, imprinting an image on all those who were touched. Therein lies the child's legacy – the only bridge connecting the chasm between the living and the dead. For each of us, the legacies left by our children differ in detail, yet at the same time are similar with respect to the precious memories, which are all that remain to provide comfort.

At first, we are inconsolable, but gradually, the reaching out of heart and hand by those who understand and can respond to such a loss touches the soul, helps soothe the unbearable pain and intense suffering. *Only a parent who has lost a child can give such a gift to another bereaved parent.*

As in any event, there is a lesson to be learned. An opportunity emerges from the sorrow – an opportunity to sort out trivia, old resentments, to perceive with clear vision that in our lives which is truly important. The tragedy we have experienced somehow enables us to establish new and more meaningful priorities; to love and to value those who are close with a renewed sense of appreciation and awareness. If any meaning is ever again to exist in our lives, it will develop as a result of newly-found sensitivity, love, and compassion for others.
