A Tough Question

We've all been subjected to inappropriate questions from people who are nosy, socially clueless or just plain rude. No one likes to be quizzed about matters that are just too personal or embarrassing to merit a glib and effortless answer. Is that a designer purse or a knockoff? Can you afford a vacation this year? How much do you weigh, earn, give to charity, pay in rent, recycle? Have you ever considered Botox? We feel righteous indignation at the lack of manners of these loathsome boors and perfectly justified in responding with hot-tempered sarcasm or icy silence.

For most people, the question *How many children do you have?* does not belong in the category described. The query falls more into the class of speech rituals employed by those who don't really know each other and have not yet determined whether they have anything of substance to share, part of the repertoire of small talk, bland and unthreatening, designed to grease the verbal engine and get the dialogue up and running. A conversation starter.

For most people, that is. Not for me. I am a parent whose son has died. I find the question emotionally wrought and unsettling, with the power to derail any budding discussion or even bring it to an awkward and abrupt halt. What do I say? I had three children but don't have one of them any longer. At least not in the flesh and blood, to touch and feed and argue (con't on page 2)

Time And Again

During the now 14 years that I have been traveling this well-worn path of grief and heartache, I have met hundreds and hundreds of others suffering as I have. Sharing our endless stories has helped me accept the pain and learn to integrate it into my life. We are all, I think, searching for answers to questions that, in spite of their futile nature, hammer away at our souls

A fellow traveler recently made a comment that I cannot seem to shake. He's only been on this journey a short time but in his quest for some healing he has had many conversations with religious leaders. These have brought him to the conclusion that if there is anything that religious leaders know ... namely priests and rabbis...they know about death. And it is death itself we struggle to understand.

I was somewhat surprised by the comment. I thought back to several of my compassionate friends... psychologists and psychotherapists ... who admitted that though they had counseled people through grief for years... until they had lost their own child, they realized they never had a clue about what their patients were going through... although they thought at the time, that they did.

Everyone who tumbles into our world is clueless. Nothing in our collective experience has prepared us for the possibility that one of our children could die. No professional has been able to describe what it feels like. No writer, despite millions of attempts, has been able to put into words what it feels like. We are all shocked, speechless, struck dumb when we land in this new, indescribable world. We spend the rest of our lives learning how to live here. We learn all there is to know about death.

I asked my friend why he thought these religious leaders were so expert about death. Did they lose a child, I asked? Well, no.

and celebrate with. Yes, I have a son in my heart and in my thoughts, always and forever, often obsessively. But I do not have a son in the land of the living where I want him to be. That would be the most truthful answer.

The first year that I lost my son, whenever a new acquaintance asked the dreaded question, I answered two daughters. The reality of my son's death was too unimaginable and surreal to articulate. I could not say the words without falling apart. I was angry and numb, and could not expose the raw and seething pain I was constantly experiencing. It took all my energy to carry out the motions of living through each day and pretending to be coping. Even now, three and a half years later, for random schmoozes with nameless strangers who I will probably never see again, two daughters is enough of an answer. The stitches that keep me intact are still very fragile and disintegrate easily.

Eventually, it became evident that I would have to find a way to express my loss to people I interacted with since my son's death. Life, somehow, goes on. New relationships are formed. If I didn't find the words to speak about my son's death early on in an encounter, the revelation became exponentially more difficult as time passed. And I understood that anyone who would be part of my world had to know about David, no less than about my other children. How many children do you have? Two daughters and a son who died.

Having made that decision, doesn't make giving my answer easier. Each time I repeat it, the unfairness and finality the response conveys is reinforced. And the acceptance. Acceptance of its reality and acceptance that the sadness and pain surrounding that reality will never leave me. For a parent who lost a son or daughter, How many children do you have? is a tough question.

But they talk to so many grieving people, he replied...It is my opinion that no one is as expert as every one of us. Those I always refer to as civilians, including religious leaders, are intent on comforting the bereaved. Accompanying us briefly through a dark period. But those who have lost a child are terminally bereaved. We carry this with us all the days of our lives. Civilians know that ultimately all wounds heal. We know that this wound is different. As I've noted before, though the intensity softens, this is one wound that continues to throb for all of time. We really know what this loss means.

The world looks at me and sees no trace of what's inside. I appear to be perfectly whole. I've learned to incorporate my missing child into my life and live each day for two. I can enjoy life once again. But because I know so much about what this feels like, I am compelled to reach out to those who are yet to arrive in this place... to be there to catch them as they fall through this veil of tears. Because every new arrival discovers a pain that has never been described... never been felt... by anyone...before.

Not many of us will, like Alan Paton, write a book to help us work our way through loss. But many have found it helpful to keep a journal – a simple notebook in which to write our thoughts and questions, express our pain, so we don't have to carry it around in our heads all the time.

We may want to look back over the journal from time to time – to remind ourselves of the emotional ups and downs of our journey, or to refresh our minds about a sequence of events. If we never look at the pages again, they will still have served us well. Just finding words for the tumult helps us understand it a little better, move through it with less danger of getting stuck, so we can reach the place where we can "fall in love again" with life.

Of course, not everyone likes to write – painting does it for some, or playing the piano – anything to open our emotional pores and let the energy of grief flow out, free us for a new life.

Grieving takes longer than we want it to. Days, months, even years go by, and we discover that the shock waves still reverberate in our scarred spirits, that our grieving is still hesitant, still halting, still sparse of those occasions that are healing.

But grief runs by its own clock, and as surely as we sometimes mourn with agonizing slowness, we will leap through other days, making astonishing strides toward recovery.

A Brother's Death

Barbara Lazaar Ascher's brother Bobby died of AIDS at the age of 31. Following is an excerpt of a beautifully written and sensitive article describing the author's struggle with grief. In an almost poetic style, she brings to life the chaos of grief. "A Brother's Death" was originally printed in the NY Times magazine.

When we first learned of Bobby's illness, it seemed incomprehensible that this could be happening to our baby brother. There were days when it seemed we had to concentrate on putting one foot in front of the other if we were to walk at all. If we traveled more than a couple of blocks, we were exhausted for the rest of the day.

We were hungry. We weren't hungry. We made chocolate chip cookies and brownies and didn't eat them. We opened and closed the refrigerator door, looking for something that might cushion the pain, fill the chasm that was opening from within.

Now I realize that this was the beginning of grief which starts in the stomach, yawning like a gaping mouth in Munch's painting "The Scream". But what did we know of grief? We were young; our beloveds had not yet died. I began to understand that grieving is like walking. The urge is there, but you need a guiding hand, you need someone to teach you how.

I went to speak to a wise and trusted minister at my church who warned there were bad times ahead. The death of a sibling, he said, grievous in itself, is also a startling reminder of our own mortality. I suppose it's not dissimilar to the time in youth when we first learned of our origins and began to understand, if they made me, then they can make another. After that we became the nervous sentinels of our territory. When a sibling dies, the absolute certainty of death replaces the cherished illusion that maybe we'll be exceptions. When a sibling dies, death tugs at our own shirttails. There is no unclasping its persistent grip. "You too", it says. "Yes, even you".

When you are new to grief, you learn there is no second-guessing it. It will have its way with you. Don't be fooled by statistics you read: Widows have one bad year; orphans three. Grief doesn't read schedules.

One morning, three weeks after Bobby died, I arose feeling happy and energetic. Well now, I thought, I guess we've taken care of that. Wrong. The next morning, I was awakened by a wail I thought was coming from the storm outside until I realized it was coming from me.

Grief will fool you with its disguises. Some days you insist you're fine, you're just angry at a friend who said the wrong thing. One day I wept into the lettuce and peaches at a local market when an acquaintance approached to scold me for my stand in an old battle. Of course, we both assumed she was responsible for my tears.

You learn that you can cry and stop and laugh and even follow a taxi driver's command to "have a nice day", and then cry again. You learn there is no such thing as crying forever. Three months ago, I was certain I would never be happy again. I was wrong.

Grief is like the wind. When it is blowing hard you adjust your sails and run before it. If it blows too hard, you stay in the harbor, close the hatches and don't take calls. When it's gentle, you go sailing, have a picnic, take a swim.
