MARKING TIME

It seems we spend our whole lives "marking time". When we are born our parents mark the first twelve months until we reach the remarkable age of one year. They don't get excited again until they mark five years and then ten. For the rest of our lives we mark every five years and really celebrate every ten – our lives are measured one decade at a a time. We refer to each of these birthdays as "milestones".

So it is natural then that we think of time as distance. The distance from birth to one year is certainly amazing. As are the changes that we experience as we grow and travel further away from our beginnings.

Marking time becomes even more pronounced after we have our own children. Only then do we recognize our own parents' delight in our milestones. As parents we begin to mark time by the changes in our children. Time is no longer a measure of you, it's a measure of them. After we lose a child, our lives become divided into two clearly defined parts – before and after. Marking time after such a loss becomes a method of measuring distance as well – but not as we've always understood it. Measuring time after losing a child becomes acute. More like "timestones" than "milestones".

During our first year as bereaved parents, while deeply in shock and disbelief, we mark all the firsts; the first week, the first month – the first birthday without them, the first Valentine's day, first Easter/Passover, first Spring, first Summer, first Halloween, first Thanksgiving, first Christmas/Chanukah – first New Year – crossing over into a year our child will never know – and then – approaching the first anniversary - their last Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday....

SUMMER THOUGHTS

Summer is a time when things naturally slow down, a time when many are waiting for the orderly routine of their lives to begin again. For those of us in grief whose lives are already in limbo, it can seem endless if we let it. Seeing children, babies and teenagers is not easy for us, and we see them everywhere from shopping centers to beaches. Everyone is out living, loving, enjoying carefree activities with their children, and we want to scream, "It's not fair!" I was sitting on my patio one evening at dusk recently listening to the shouts of children playing, and I was crying as I remembered the sounds that my child used to make. I became very depressed as I thought what a long summer this was going to be.

In my reverie, I was reminded of a recent comment that I had heard at a TCF meeting: "My child was such a loving, giving person. He would not want me to waste my life being bitter." "I also remember a good friend telling me to "count my blessings" and naming all the things I had to be grateful for. I was furious at that time. Nothing I had to be grateful for could compensate for the fact that my child had died. Now, sitting in the twilight of this early summer evening, I began to see things differently. I determined that this summer would not be an eternity: I would not let it be. I decided first of all to stay busy.

I am also going to try to enjoy the simple things that used to give me so much pleasure, like flowers, and working in my garden. I then decided to try to be truly grateful for the blessings that I have, like my husband, my friends, my job etc. It has been almost 5 years for me, and I know that last year this would not have worked. Of course I still have times of sadness; I know I always will. But I have decided that in the process of grieving we close so many doors, the only way to recovery is to reopen them gradually at our own pace.

I know I will never be the same person I was before the death of my child, but I hope eventually in some ways I will be a better person because suffering can be beneficial if we learn and grow through it. A year ago I didn't feel that way, and I know I still have a long way to go, but in the meantime, I know the greatest tribute to my child will be to enjoy this summer as he would have done.

For the rest of our lives, we mark time. The dreaded first anniversary that leads us to believe things will be different, that the pain will abate. Discovering that the intensity of marking all the firsts has been a distraction that now, in the second year the reality of absence is the major focus. They're really gone. We wonder if the despair will ever lift. We mark the second anniversary -the second "timestone".

Grief work consumes us. Then one day we realize there was a millisecond of thought that wasn't accompanied by the permanent reel running in our head. It is a beginning – another "timestone". We continue our struggle to survive and we do – marking each year until we have lived five years without our child's presence. Five years. Another "timestone".

We expected to be much further along after so much time. But it seems like only yesterday. Until you meet another bereaved parent who just landed here. Then you recognize the distance you've traveled -the time you've marked.

And so it will be for the rest of our lives. Learning to remember our kids with a smile and reaching all the timestones that await. The ten year mark, the twenty year mark...getting close and closer to our waiting children even as we continue to treasure their memories and continue to remind the world that they were here.

Ultimately we recognize how they enriched our lives, how much better we are for having had the joy of them. We are who we become because they lived and taught us a whole new dimension in loving. Coming to that realization is the ultimate "timestone".

A BROTHER'S DEATH

By Barbara Lazaar Ascher

Barbara Lazaar Ascher's brother Bobby died of AIDS at the age of 31. Following is an excerpt of a beautifully written and sensitive article describing the author's struggle with grief. In an almost poetic style, she brings to life the chaos of grief. "A Brother's Death" was originally printed in the NY Times magazine.

When we first learned of Bobby's illness, it seemed incomprehensible that this could be happening to our baby brother. There were days when it seemed we had to concentrate on putting one foot in front of the other if we were to walk at all. If we traveled more than a couple of blocks, we were exhausted for the rest of the day.

We were hungry. We weren't hungry. We made chocolate chip cookies and brownies and didn't eat them. We opened and closed the refrigerator door, looking for something that might cushion the pain, fill the chasm that was opening from within.

Now I realize that this was the beginning of grief which starts in the stomach, yawning like a gaping mouth in Munch's painting "The Scream". But what did we know of grief? We were young; our beloveds had not yet died. I began to understand that grieving is like walking. The urge is there, but you need a quiding hand, you need someone to teach you how.

I went to speak to a wise and trusted minister at m church who warned there were bad times ahead. The death of a sibling, he said, grievous in itself, is also a startling reminder of our own mortality. I suppose its no dissimilar to the time in youth when we first learned of our origins and began to understand, if they made me, then they can make another. After that we became the nervous sentinels of our territory. When a sibling dies, the absolute certainty of death replaces the cherished illusion that maybe we'll be exceptions. When a sibling dies, death tugs at our own shirttails. There is no unclasping its persistent grip. "You too", it says. "Yes, even you".

When you are new to grief, you learn there is no secondguessing it. It will have its way with you. Don't be fooled by statistics you read: Widows have one bad year; orphans three. Grief doesn't read schedules.

One morning, three weeks after Bobby died, I arose feeling happy and energetic. Well now, I thought, I guess we've taken care of that. Wrong. The next morning I was awakened by a wail I thought was coming from the storm outside until I realized it was coming from me.

Grief will fool you with its disguises. Some days you insist you're fine, you're just angry at a friend who said the wrong thing. One day I wept into the lettuce and peaches at a local market when an acquaintance approached to scold me for my stand in an old battle. Of course, we both assumed she was responsible for my tears.

You learn that you can cry and stop and laugh and even follow a taxi drivers command to "have a nice day", and then cry again. You learn there is no such thing as crying forever. Three months ago I was certain I would never be happy again. I was wrong.

Grief is like the wind. When it is blowing hard you adjust your sails and run before it. If it blows too hard, you stay in the harbor, close the hatches and don't take calls. When it's gentle, you go sailing, have a picnic, take a swim .

Healing a Parents Grieving Heart – 100 practical ideas after your child dies by Alan Wolfelt, helps parents understand and reconcile grief. Covers common challenges such as dealing with marital stress, helping surviving siblings dealing with hurtful advice and exploring feelings of guilt.

Into the Valley and Out Again – The story of a Fathers Journey by Rich Edler. After the unexpected death of his son, Rich's life seemed to stop. It is a man's story about what is important in life, sorrow, faith, acceptance and rebirth.

"If you love me let me go"

I don't know to whom to ascribe this quotation. It came to me as a variant of a current popular song several months after my daughter's death. It has been my experience over several years that the songs that go through my head are usually telling me something. In this case the tune was for a song with which I was only marginally familiar. "If you love me let me know." But for me the words were, "If you love me let me go."

If there is a way, which some have suggested, that the spirits of the dead continue to hover close until they see we are going to be all right, until they feel freed to go, then perhaps, through some flash implant in my spirit, my daughter was telling me something. At the time, I thought of the message in these terms.

It is all conjecture of course, and who knows whether we are projecting our own needs in these images of What Happens Next or whether we are intuitively onto some truth?

But from whatever source, with whatever corroboration or lack of it, this was a good message for me to hear just then.
